







ABOVE: "Weiner-Dog Twig and Granny." A portriat of my roomamtes' pets, this was done as a Christmas present and was one of my biggest undertakings to date. Being the largest at 19 x 24 inches, featuring both a dog and a cat, and taking nearly a month for completion, I consider it to be the masterpiece of the pet portraits. Pastels on Canson paper.

NEXT LEFT: "Bonsai." Easily one of my favorites of the portraits. I was so fortunate to receive a reference photo that had captured Bonsai's personality so perfectly. His happy and goofy expression made it feel more like a caricature rather than a portrait. It was a incredibly fun piece and I couldn't have been happier with the final product. Pastels on Strathmore Gray Scale.

NEXT RIGHT: "Milton." This was the fastest turnaround I've done for a portrait, completing it in less than a day. Pastels on Strathmore Toned Gray sketch paper with medium surface.

THE MOST POPULAR AND ACCLAIMED PIECES

LEFT: "Red." This was an unique piece because two reference photos were used, a black and white portrait of a cocker spaniel for the pose and anatomy and a stock photo of an English Springer for the coloring. This was a large 19 x 24 inch drawing done as a donation for Friends of the Shelter annual charity auction, "Pup Art." On July 22, I uploaded "Red' to Reddit's r/art subreddit where for several hours it became the top post with nearly eleven-thousand "up-votes." Pastels on Canson.

BELOW: "The Fibonacci Shake." A combination of pastel drawing and acrylic splatter, this was done for 400 West Rich Art Gallery's first "Amazing Dog Show" in the summer of 2017. It was one of the first pieces sold and staff and volunteers of the gallery regarded the piece as one of their favorites from the show. Pastels on Canson with arcrylic paint on acetate.



NEXT PAGE: "Log Thrown." While working at a veterinary hospital doing social media, I was frequently taking photos of the veterinarian's extremely photogenic French bulldog, Felix. Truthfuly, I forget what the original intent was this photo session was but I was able to catch this lighting in a bottle moment when Felix made a curious expression over a bird call. This photo was considered for a Jones Soda label. Canon T3i with 50mm lens.
